


- Revise the tricky 'oi' words from last time: point, coins, boil, soil, avoid, join, spoil.

- Remember to circle the 'oi' piece of code in the words.
- If you are not sure what a word means or says <u>underline</u> it and ask an adult afterwards.
- OPTIONAL: At the bottom of the mini story draw a picture linked to the story. (Helps with comprehension) Example: Sam pointing to the rocks.





After you have finished this work read a book for at least 10 minutes.





- Practise reading and learning to spell these words.

- When do we use capital letters? We use them for the start of a sentence and names of places, days and months.
- TASK: Copy the sentences into your book. Practising your handwriting (letter formation).
- YEAR I: The sentences are missing capital letters and full stops. When you copy the sentences make sure you include these.
- YEAR 2: The text is missing lots of punctuation. This might be: full stops, capital letters, question marks, exclamation marks, apostrophes or commas. Read through carefully and proofread the text. Then copy into your book including the correct punctuation.


Count carefully and make sure you write your numbers the right way.


- TASK 2: Write out your 2s (forwards and backwards) into your book.


I. I have nine 2p coins in my pocket. My dad then gives another 2p coin. How much money have I got in my pocket now?


2. If I start off with 10 pairs of shoes. I then lose one shoe, then buy one new pair of shoes. How many individual shoes do I have now?












LO: To know who we can talk to if you're worried.

Write anyone you might talk to but who can't really reply in the middle e.g. God, pets etc.


TASK:
