Literacy - activity 1

Imagine you are Tom up in the crows nest of the pirate ship. Can you create an imaginary crows nest? Use a washing basket or a box, you might want a flag and a telescope too! Imagine you are just like Tom, up high in the crows nest above the sea. What can you see?



Nursery friends: talking task – use your imagination to pretend you are a pirate in your ship. Tell your grown up what you can see from the top of the crows nest.

Cherry friends: Use your imagination to pretend you are a pirate in your ship. Write some sentences to describe what you can see from the top of the crows nest!



Literacy - activity 2 A Pirates Map

Tom goes an adventure with the Night Pirates, first they start off at Toms house, then they travel across the sea and find there way to an island full of grown up pirates and treasure! Yesterday you imagined what you saw from the pirate ship, use those ideas to create your own map to the treasure!

Nursery friends: use mark making skills to create representations of places and things on a treasure map.

Cherry friends: Draw the things that you travel past to get to the treasure! Write labels for these and maybe even warning signs! Remember to start at your house, like Tom did in the story. You might go past some mountains, palm trees, a mermaid cove, even some sharks!





Literacy - activity 3

Ten Little Pirates!

Something happens to each one of the ten pirates in the story! We start with 10 and then there are 9, then 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1!

Cherry friends:




E.g.: '8 little pirates eating bananas, oh no a monkey now there are 7.'

(It doesn't have to rhyme but it is a good opportunity to talk about the rhyming words in the story)

See next page for a template/example, how many can you fill in? They can be as funny as you like! (You could do 3 or 5 little pirates as10 is a challenge.)

Nursery friends: listen to the story and see if you can hear the words that rhyme. Can you finish the rhyming string E.g. *six little pirates trying to stay alive, chomp goes a giant squid, now there are... five.* Are there any other words that rhyme *alive, five, dive, hive* – can you continue the rhyming string?

Literacy - activity 4 Message in a bottle

Pirates used to write letters and put them into bottles, then float them out to sea for others to find!

Cherry friends:

Can you write your own message to go into a bottle?

Write a message to describe what you are like – imagine you are a pirate!

What is your pirate name? What ship do you sail? Do you have a parrot? Do you have a hat or an eye patch? How about a peg leg!



Remember not to put bottles out in the water of rivers or the sea as we know this is pollution and dangerous to our earth.

Nursery friends:

Can you draw a picture of yourself as a pirate?

Copy, trace or write your name on your message too.

(This is about children giving meaning to the marks they make.)

Literacy - activity 5

An adventure story!

Todays task is about creating your own pirate story!

Think about the stories you have listened to and maybe some of the maths and creative activities you have done.

Your story might be about a treasure hunt, maybe an encounter with mermaids or sharks, if you use some props you can imagine and act out your story before you write it.

How does your story start? What happens first? Where are you? You could be at home like Tom in the Night Pirates or on your ship like Ten Little Pirates. What happens in the middle, do you meet some pirates, some parrots, mermaids or find treasure?

Activity 1

Activity 1 – Creating and talking about patterns.

Take a kitchen roll (or loo roll) to use as a telescope. Alternatively use paper or card, possibly from a cereal box, and roll up to make a tube.

Talk about how to make patterns looking at colour and shape. To make this more piratey use your skills in pattern to make an AB pattern. (Remember grown ups you need to repeat this 3 times to consolidate the learning.) Or if you are feeling adventurous create a new pattern! This could be with paints or with tape you have around the house



Activity 1 – identifying shapes.

Use your telescope to see how many different shapes you can find. You can record these in a tally chart, make one mark for each of the shapes that you see, then two, three, four and cross for the fifth mark. You might want to look through your telescope for 3D shapes...you will need to look very carefully!




Activity 3 – Sorting, grouping and counting.

What can you make walk the plank? Will it float or will it sink?

Collect a set of objects from around your house to experiment with. Pick a number to aim for, let's say 10. Cherry friends can make these into a numbered list to tick off.

Find something to use as the sea – the bath is a good option! If you want to invent an added plank then feel free or you could just walk down your arm. Make the objects walk the plank!

Activity 4 – Using shapes for a purpose, exploring weight.

In our stories the pirates have a pirate ship! Use your design and maths skills to make a ship that can carry some important pirate treasure after following a treasure map! Your challenge is to make a ship that can hold 5 pieces of treasure!



Have a look around the house for something you think will float for example a margarine tub or a plastic bottle or a lid. Grown ups if you have any corks around these will all help your pirate ship! Think about the design of your ship. Will it have windows? What shape will they be? A good ship will need a mast and a sail. All ships have a name. What will you call your ship? Test out your ship to see if it will hold 5 pieces of treasure.

Activity 4 – Exploring symmetry.

The very famous flag pirates have on their ship is called "The Jolly Rodger." Can you make your own flag and give it a name?

You will need some big paper, or small if you want to make it for the little ship you have made. Other ideas, you could use an old plain T-shirt or any other spare plain fabric. You will need a stick like a lolly stick or straw for a small one or even a broom handle for a larger one! The jolly Rodger was designed to warn that the pirates were coming! Will yours be a warning or a welcome? Your challenge is to make your flag the same on both sides (Symmetrical) Fold your paper /card / fabric down the middle – draw a faint pencil line to help you. If you put a square on one side you have to do it on the other!

Activity 5 – Number ordering



Using number cards, sticks or just numbers written on paper. See which numbers your child recognises.

Can they then put them into order?

Extend them by moving some numbers out of order, see if they can spot the mistake you have made and correct it for you.

You can also ask what is one more than a number and some children may be able to tell you one less too.

Activity 5 – Number problems.



Some pirates are not particularly good at finding treasure. Can you be a good first mate and help the pirates work out if their maps are rubbish or will lead to treasure? Find two containers to be rubbish or treasure – unless you want to make your own treasure chest! Look at the pirates counting and see if it is right – treasure, or wrong – rubbish! Help the pirates with their counting!

The maps that have the right answers lead to the treasure!


This weeks Phonics activities are all about sound discrimination! Choose a different activity each day – there is another slide with an activity for rhyming as the focus.

Phonics Focus skill - rhythm and rhyme.

Nursery

Go to the Rhyming Disco!

The children love having a rhyming disco at school, we all find a spot to stand on and that's the spot where we stand for the disco – we don't move around the room it's an on the spot disco!

First we have to choose a word to rhyme, like cat. We start before we play the music by talking about words that rhyme e.g. rug – bug, tug, hug, mug etc. The words don't have to all be real words so you could have zug and fug too.

Next we play the music and when we can hear the rhythm we will start saying one word to the beat 'hug, hug, hug, hug, hug'. We add an action/dance move to this. Then on the next beat we will say another word 'bug, bug, bug, bug, bug. We repeat until we end up with four words and actions – 'hug, hug, hug, hug' 'bug, bug, bug, bug' 'rug, rug, rug, rug, rug' 'mug, mug, mug, mug'.

The children know how to have a rhyming disco so will just need your help to recognise the rhyming words enjoy it!




Creative/Home Learning Ideas

You might need some help to do this! Do the same for your other foot if you can fit it on. Have a look – that is the size of your feet! Decorate by colouring in, making patterns or giving yourself fancy toenails or an ankle cuff/bracelet. Extra – you could get someone else to do the same and compare sizes!
